Dietitian, South Western Sydney Local Health District

Marianne is Deputy Head of Dietetics at Liverpool Hospital and a senior dietitian with extensive experience in clinical education, leadership, and service improvement. Her approach to education is grounded in promoting psychologically safe learning environments and role modelling a growth mindset, supporting clinicians to build confidence, resilience, and clinical excellence.

She supports learning across clinical, multidisciplinary, and organisational settings, helping clinicians and students deliver high-quality, evidence-based, patient-centred care while navigating the challenges of complex healthcare environments. Marianne has led and contributed to facility-wide, district, and statewide education and quality initiatives, including models of care, clinical guidelines, competency standards, accreditation standards, and digital health improvements.

Through mentorship, supervision, and innovative education programs, Marianne supports the development of well-rounded clinicians who are equipped to thrive, collaborate, and continually improve care for the diverse and vulnerable populations within South Western Sydney Local Health District.

Georgia Lloyd

Pharmacist, Sydney Children's Hospitals Network

Georgia is an experienced hospital pharmacist with a strong focus on evidence-based adult learning, quality improvement, and workforce

development. She is the Lead Pharmacist – Workforce Development at SCHN, where she leads training programs for undergraduate, intern, and registered pharmacists across the organisation.

Georgia has a background in clinical pharmacy practice, teaching, and project management. Career highlights include implementing Partnered Pharmacist Medication Charting (PPMC) models of care across Victoria and NSW and designing and delivering training programs to upskill pharmacists in rural and regional hospital settings. Her contributions to the field of education and training have been recognised through her appointment as a Fellow of the Australian and New Zealand College of Advanced Pharmacists.

She is a PhD candidate at UNSW, with research focused on collaborative pharmacist prescribing models and medication safety in paediatric care. Georgia also serves as a Conjoint Lecturer with the UNSW School of Health Sciences, supporting the development of future health professionals.

Donna Napier

Donna Napier is the lead Sonographer at Tweed Valley Hospital. She is a passionate educator, committed to achieving health equity for patients in regional and underserved communities, and plays a vital role in upskilling medical professionals in ultrasound practice.

An expert in ocular sonography, Donna has empowered emergency clinicians in regional Australia and emerging nations

to detect vision-threatening conditions using ultrasound, filling a critical service deficit and expediting vision-saving ophthalmic referral. She has mentored rural obstetricians to obtain formal ultrasound qualifications and enhanced the men's health sonographic knowledge base. As an outreach volunteer, Donna has provided life-saving ultrasound training to remote clinicians, improving diagnostic accuracy for First Nations communities in central Australia.

An Author of ten peer-reviewed publications, advisor on national policy and prolific speaker, Donna has advanced sonography education and influenced treatment pathways. She has five professional awards relating to educational excellence, recently named ASUM Australasian Educator of the Year.

Katrina Wakely

Occupational Therapist, Hunter New England Local Health District

Katrina Wakely is an experienced Occupational Therapist and educator with a strong commitment to rural health education, student learning, and early career workforce development. A proud Gomerioi woman, Katrina lives and works on Gomerioi Country, bringing valuable rural knowledge and lived experience into her teaching and supervision practice. With over 25 years of professional experience, her work has focused on paediatric occupational therapy education, student support, and clinical supervision.

Katrina is passionate about designing and delivering high-quality learning experiences that foster skill development, reflective practice, and culturally safe care among students and early career clinicians.

She is actively involved in allied health workforce pipeline development, playing a key role in the Hunter New England Local Health District Year 10 allied health work experience program across the New England region. Katrina currently works as a Rural Allied Health Educator and Occupational Therapy Professional Lead with Hunter New England Local Health District.

Victoria Young

Radiographer, Western NSW Local Health District

Victoria has worked as a radiographer at Cowra Hospital for 18 years, including 12 years as Chief Radiographer. In this role, she also supports nurses, doctors and physiotherapists trained as Remote X-Ray Operators (RXOs). In 2023, in partnership with HETI, the 20-year-old Remote X Ray Operator program was redesigned to be delivered by NSW Health. Western NSW Local Health District led the pilot with Victoria serving as the lead educator, delivering the program on behalf of NSW Health.

Her extensive rural and remote imaging experience has been central to program redevelopment, resource creation, advocacy, and supporting participants. Within Western NSW Local Health District, she continues to travel to sites to provide face to face support to RXOs, ensure imaging environments are appropriate and maintain consistency of practice.

The rejuvenated program has trained 30 new RXO's with 24 more expected by July 2026, enabling over 1300 RXO examinations to be performed annually in remote communities and allowing care close to home.

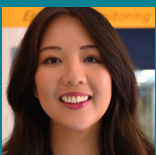

The Allied Health Researcher of the Year has made exemplary contributions to research to enhance allied health practice and services.

Their activities have been impactful and can be translated into practice, and they are proud to be an allied health professional working in NSW Health.

They contribute to building capacity to conduct and translate research in allied health services, for example by supervising research students, leading research teams, or mentoring novice researchers.

The areas of excellence for the Allied Health Researcher of the Year are:

- research that is published in peer-reviewed scientific journals, contributing to the evidence base for allied health practice in their field, and has led work to translate this research into practice,
- partners with consumers, communities, colleagues and/or academic partners to conduct research that contributes to consumer-centred improvements in clinical care or health service delivery, and
- empowers and upskills allied health clinicians in research and fosters a progressive culture of learning and innovation.

Associate Professor Ronald Castelino

Pharmacist, Western Sydney Local Health District

Ron is a specialist kidney pharmacist at Blacktown Hospital and an Associate Professor at the University of Sydney, with extensive experience in health services research aimed at reducing medication-related harm and improving the quality use of medicines (QUM) in people with kidney disease.

He has led research with national and international impact, including leading a multidisciplinary group on the first national trial of pharmacy-based screening and QUM in kidney disease. Ron has published over 130 high-quality peer-reviewed papers, with his work translated into practice and cited in international guidelines. He is recognised for his leadership in medication safety and has secured several grants in competitive research funding as a principal investigator.

Ron has mentored pharmacists, nurses and supervised over 40 research projects, including 15 PhD completions (six at Blacktown Hospital). He represents pharmacy on the Blacktown-Mount Druitt Hospital Research Committee, where he plays a key role in strengthening research culture and capability within allied health.

Associate Professor Suzie Ferrie

Dietitian, Sydney Local Health District

Since 2001, Dr Suzie Ferrie has been the Critical Care Dietitian in the ICU at Sydney's Royal Prince Alfred Hospital. She is also a Clinical Associate Professor

at the University of Sydney and Fellow of Dietitians Australia, and is currently serving as Chair of RPA's human research ethics committee.

As a clinician researcher, she is an author of over 50 peer-reviewed journal papers and a number of book chapters and consumer nutrition articles, with research interests that include gut function in critical illness, and methods for nutritional assessment and monitoring in the ICU. Her highly-cited publications have been incorporated into guidelines and pharmaceutical product information, and referenced in MIMS, Australia's leading independent drug information resource.

Suzie is dedicated to supporting novice researchers and students to start their research journey, and has contributed to supervision of more than 40 higher-degree research student projects (including Nutrition and Dietetics Master and PhD candidates).

Dr Jannah Jones

Dietitian, Hunter New England Local Health District

Dr Jannah Jones is a dietitian and early career researcher and is currently working as a Nutrition Program Manager and Clinical & Health Services Research Fellow within the Population Health Unit at Hunter New England Local Health District. Her research focuses on designing, evaluating and scaling evidence-based child nutrition initiatives across community settings, including early childhood services and primary schools.

Dr Jones has published >50 peer-reviewed journal articles in leading nutrition, public health and implementation science journals and has secured

>\$2 million in competitive research funding. Her integrated research-practice role has enabled rapid translation of research into policy and practice, informing state-wide prevention programs delivered to thousands of schools and early childhood services across NSW and Australia.

Dr Jones is also committed to building research capacity within the allied health workforce, supervising Honours and PhD students and leading communities of practice to support innovation, evaluation and scale-up.

Meegan Shepherd

Radiation Therapist, Northern Sydney Local Health District

Meegan is a Radiation Therapist (RT) at Royal North Shore Hospital and researcher specialising in education, motion management, adaptive-radiotherapy (ART) and emerging technologies (AI) in cancer. She holds three Masters degrees in Radiotherapy, Education and Advanced Practice, soon to commence doctoral studies.

Meegan leads and contributes to multiple clinical trials across gastro-intestinal cancer, ART and AI-enabled radiotherapy. Her research is published in local and international journals, translated into practice, workforce credentialing and models of care that reduce patient burden, elevate RTs, support value-based healthcare and improve outcomes.

With nearly two decades of NSW Health service, Meegan is driven by an interest in the future of radiotherapy. She explores how advanced practice, AI and ART can reshape patient care

and the workforce. She has academic appointments with Monash and Sydney University, is secretary of the Australia-New Zealand Medical Radiation Research Network and chair of the global RT-led ART community of practice.

Erica Tsang

Dietitian, Sydney Children's Hospitals Network

Erica Tsang is an Advanced Accredited Practising Dietitian and clinician-researcher at the Sydney Children's Hospitals Network, specialising in ketogenic therapies for paediatric neurological disorders. With over a decade of experience in paediatric clinical research, her work bridges scientific discovery with clinical care to improve outcomes for children with complex neurological conditions.

Erica's research adopts a precision medicine approach, integrating nutritional epigenomics and next-generation sequencing technologies to investigate how diet influences gene regulation and clinical outcomes. She has published in high-impact, peer-reviewed journals and presented her PhD research at national and international conferences, receiving awards for research excellence and innovation.

Erica is the Asia-Pacific Lead of the International Ketogenic Dietitians Research Network and a co-author of international best practice guidelines on ketogenic diets in infants with epilepsy. Passionate about workforce development, she also leads initiatives to strengthen research culture and clinician-researcher career pathways across allied health.
