

Transcript: Smoking bans in New South Wales

Smoking is banned in a range of public places under the Smoke-free Environment Act 2000.

These bans protect you and others from harmful second-hand tobacco smoke from cigarettes, pipes and water-pipes. There is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke.

The Act bans smoking in **all enclosed** public places such as shopping centres, cinemas, libraries, trains and buses.

The Act also bans smoking in a number of **outdoor** public places where people queue or gather. These include:

- Within 10 metres of children's play equipment in outdoor public places;
- Public swimming pools;
- Spectator areas at sports grounds or other recreational areas used for organised sporting events;
- Public transport stops and platforms, including ferry wharves and taxi ranks;
- Within 4 metres of a pedestrian access point to a public building; and
- Commercial outdoor dining areas.

If a person breaks these bans, they could receive a \$300 fine on the spot. The business owner of an outdoor dining area of a restaurant, café, club or hotel may also be penalised up to \$5,500.
